n behalf of the General Manager and myself, we are pleased to present you with an overview of the ways in which your SADC has contributed to the development of the Coaticook region and to the well-being of the community this year.

At this juncture, the labour and housing shortages have become two inseparable issues, which are compounded by the lack of daycare spaces. We need to attract newcomers, but we're having trouble accommodating them, and when it comes to families, we're struggling to keep up with the demand for daycare spaces. Along with its partners, the SADC is actively seeking short-, medium- and

long-term solutions. We hired a project manager to follow through on the recommendations arising from the housing consultations and to carry out smaller projects, such as helping newcomers integrate into the job market or launching a campaign to find rooms for rent in local homes. There's no end in sight to this situation, which will force us to come up with new solutions and approaches, as has always been the case when a crisis strikes.

The SADC is no exception. This year, the General Manager had to take several months off work. But thanks to our dedicated permanent staff and the Board of Directors—and with help from a retired general manager—we were able to pull through. We wish to extend our deepest thanks to Louise Paradis for her time, passion and dedication. But we need to stay focused on finding solutions, not only to the staff shortages but also to other types of employee leaves, planned and unplanned.

Despite this, two unexpected issues kept the team busy, on top of ongoing activities. The first was the cybersecurity audit, a prerequisite to implementing the measures needed to comply with Bill 25. The other was the introduction of the Projet d'aide aux petites entreprises touristiques rurales (PAPETR) [Project to help small rural tourism businesses], which allowed us to grant \$277,231 in non-repayable financial assistance to 10 small tourism businesses in a very short period.

During this year's retreat for members of the permanent staff and the Board members, we realized that we'd allocated \$973,000 to the community in 2022. We also looked at ways to increase our organizational efficiency, in particular by acquiring powerful IT solutions, improving our policies to align with the current economic situation (if only by adding sustainable development criteria to our loan process), and helping the next generation of businesses. We will also need to carry out a new strategic planning process following the renewal of our contract with Canada Economic Development (CED) for 2024 to 2029. Finally, we're planning a tour of the municipalities during which we'll meet with elected officials to explain what an incredible resource the SADC is for our community and how they can tap into its full potential.

In closing, we wish to thank CED for letting us pursue our mission, and the Réseau des SADC et CAE du Québec for their support in making it happen.

LOCAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT FOR THE WELL-BEING OF THE REGION

The creation of new businesses and jobs in a region as dynamic as Coaticook can only be achieved by all stakeholders working together, in harmony. Our vision of development is based on collaboration and innovation and draws on the strengths of the entire territory we serve. Every SADC-led initiative in the community is designed to stimulate economic, social and cultural development in the region, positioning it favourably on the provincial job market.

Our actions have a major impact, contributing directly to economic vitality and growth, while providing stability for well-established local businesses.



Community support achievements in 2022-2023

The SADC focuses its expertise and financial assistance on a number of different areas, all of which help to establish a clear and constructive plan for the region. Each of these initiatives is designed to promote the development or sustainability of the region's communities, first and foremost. In line with this, we've seen the appearance of "buy local" campaigns and projects focused on a major issue for the region, namely the housing crisis.

LOCALCOATICOO

In collaboration with local stakeholders, the SADC helped set up a "buy local" campaign to attract attention for local merchants. As part of the campaign, residents could purchase \$40 gift certificates for the price of \$30 at some 30 participating businesses. The September 2022 arm of the campaign raised more than \$30,000, which was invested back into the community. The SADC helped out by designing the communication tools for the campaign.

Housing project

The housing shortage isn't just a city problem. It's affecting communities across Quebec, and the Coaticook region is no exception. For several years now, the Coaticook SADC has been a member of the Housing monitoring committee, whose mission is to support various housing projects. As such, it contributed \$20,000 toward the salary for the project manager assigned to housing in the MRC de Coaticook.

À bras ouverts and its communication plan

The housing shortage is considered a priority in our action plan. The impacts of the crisis are widespread and directly affect the region's economic potential, severely undermining its ability to attract workers and diminishing its appeal. In exploring different solutions, the Coaticook SADC worked with local stakeholders to establish a communication plan. This led to the À bras ouverts movement, which is based on the principles of hospitality and sharing and encourages people to welcome immigrants into their homes.

Technical assistance and other LED projects

The business model, technologies and operating tools need to be adapted faster in order to remain competitive in a constantly evolving market. The SADC's technical assistance component helps businesses and organizations get equipped to tackle the many challenges they may encounter.

This year, our team focused its initiatives on providing personalized guidance for businesses. Given the current economic climate, we wanted to prioritize onsite visits and spend time with each individual business. This gave us better insight into their specific challenges and allowed us to tailor our support, which both increased the chances of their projects succeeding and helped them adapt better to market realities.

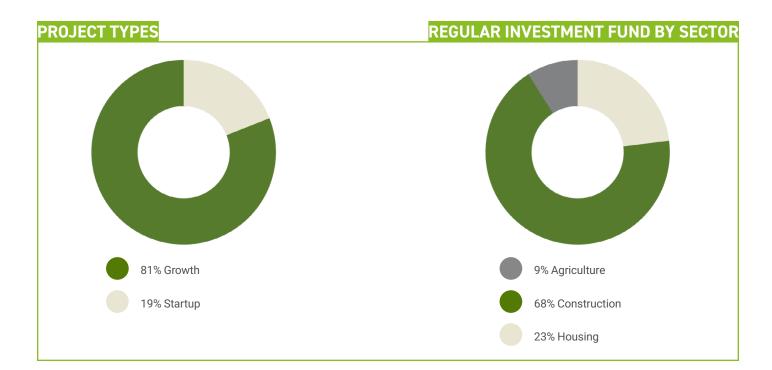

REGULAR INVESTMENT FUND

The SADC has an investment fund dedicated to SMEs and business leaders to support their acquisition, start-up, expansion, modernization and succession projects. The purpose of this fund is twofold. First, it must ensure that jobs are created or maintained, and that each project being considered for a loan has the potential for profitability and viability.



YOUTH INVESTMENT FUND (STRATÉGIE JEUNESSE)

The goal of the YIF is to encourage young people ages 18 to 39 to start their own business and to complete a project that inspires them, making a dream come true. This fund is a unique financial product that consists of personal loans ranging from \$5,000 to \$25,000. It represents a powerful springboard for large projects.

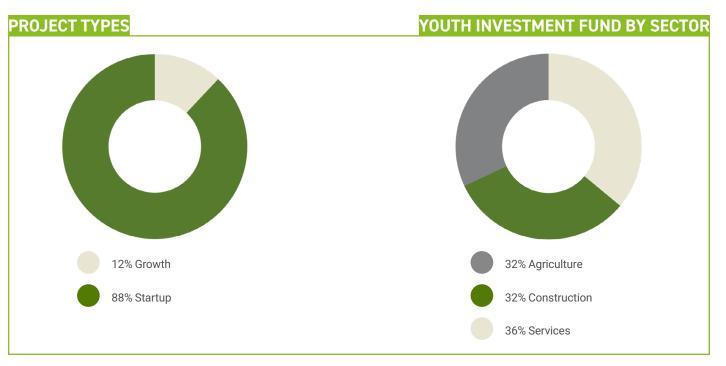

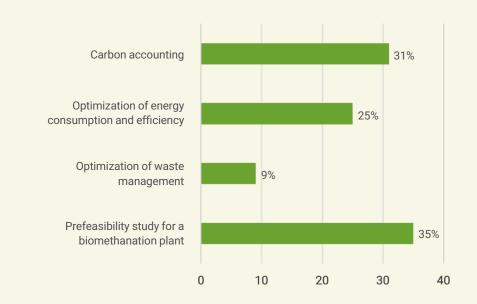

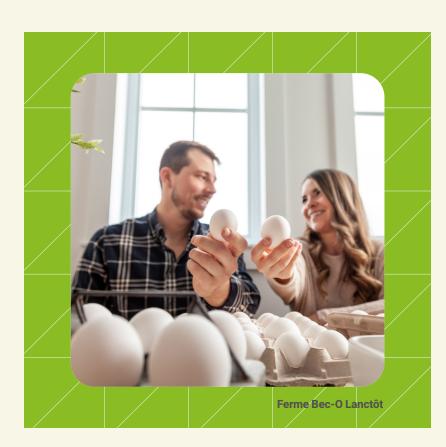
